





ETAC Group Learning at High School ILC

On October 15, 2015 the Lincoln Intermediate Educational Technology Advisory Council (ETAC) held its October meeting at Hanover Public School District in Hanover High School's Integrative Learning Center.

The ETAC group is made up of Technology Coordinators, Directors, Administrators and Integration Specialists across many counties. The purpose of this meeting was to tour and learn about the Hanover High School and Hanover Middle School Integrative Learning Centers which were designed to transform the learning experience for students and staff of the Hanover Public School District.

Technology Director, Mr. David Fry, shared Superintendent Dr. John Scola's vision and the HPSD team's process from idea to fruition. Mr. Fry,



along with Technology Integration Specialist, Mrs. Rebecca Conover, and her students demonstrated usage of ILC components including Night Hawk Studios, 3D printers, Laser Engraver, Vinyl Cutter, Virtual Reality Stations, Gaming Areas, Presentation Studios, Technology Lending Library, and Presentation Studio. Dr. Susan Seiple, Assistant to Superintendent, explained the seamless curricular integration that is occurring in a variety of subject areas.

Hanover Public School District students and staff members are benefiting from the Integrative Technology Centers. These centers would not have been possible without the generous donation from the Hanover Shoe Farm Foundation.

Sparks Creativity in the High School ILC

The Hanover High School Integrative Learning Center is proud to highlight a tremendous group of students known as the "Spark Squad." The Spark Squad is a group of creative, innovative, and tech-savvy students that serve at the Help Desk in the ILC under the direction of Mrs. Conover, our Technology Integration Specialist. These students are assigned to the ILC for one period each day to assist students in making the most of the equipment available to them in the ILC.

Through experimenting, tinkering, watching instructional videos, and with some help from Mrs. Conover, our Spark Squad students learned not only how to use each piece of equipment, but also how the equipment works. They assist Mrs. Conover by providing great customer service to the students who come to the ILC. Mike Minetos says that one of the most challenging

aspects of being a member of the Spark Squad

is when he has to assist a student with a piece of equipment he hasn't quite mastered yet. Mariah Spenner shared she finds having to fix a piece of equipment that isn't working to be the most challenging part of her job.

Spark Squad students are encouraged to be creative and innovative. These students will seek out unique pathways to direct their own learning as well as the learning of their classmates. The Spark Squad not only helps students to learn how to

use each piece of equipment, but they design projects that serve as models and examples for other students to modify or replicate. Jessica Reed created jewelry using our laser engraver. Mason Johnson says his goal is to one day create a "wearable" suit using the 3D printer, and a two feet replica of a castle with an entire town inside.

The Spark Squad members also demonstrate leadership by being great role models for their classmates. They model the responsible use of

social media, encouraging others to create a positive digital footprint. They will write blog posts that highlight ILC equipment and how it can be used in the classroom. Mike Minetos loves being able to help, and being the "go to guy" who knows what to do if there are problems. He enjoys that kind of leadership. Mariah enjoys the opportunity she gets to collaborate with students when she serves in the ILC. Kate Rice says she would love to create a time lapse video that demonstrates how the 3D printer creates an object from start to finish.

The Spark Squad stole the show during the ILC Open House and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony. Stationed at one of the many features of the ILC, these students provided a guided tour of all the tools and equipment. They did an outstanding job presenting and answering questions.

The High School is proud of all of the efforts that Mrs. Conover and her Spark Squad have made. We are all looking forward to seeing more sparks fly in the ILC.

A Busy Beginning At Clearview Elementary

The start of the year was busy at Clearview Elementary. We were busy with new bussing for students, and a lot of activities for our students.

For the last five years we have offered our Outdoor Movie Night for not only Clearview students but for the students at Hanover

St. and Washington as well. This is a great way for the kids to meet new friends before entering the middle school.

At the start of the year we also need to know our students' academic strengths and needs so we can offer targeted instruction. We do this with a variety of benchmark tests such as the following: An assessment called DIBELS gives us information on students' reading fluency. Another assessment, AimsWeb, helps us



determine how well the students know their math facts and if they can apply math concepts. Fontas & Pinnell benchmark helps testing determine reading levels in the area of comprehension and fluency. Finally, we offer students who meet certain criteria System 44 and LLI (Leveled Literacy

Instruction) overseen by our Reading Specialist.

The teachers administer these assessments at the beginning of the school year so they know exactly how to help their students. This process has been beneficial for the Clearview students. Last year, we again attained PSSA scores that were above the state average and extremely competitive across the state of Pennsylvania.

Fourth Graders Strive to be the "Honorary Hawk"

Have you heard of an Honorary Hawk? You might have if you have been to a Hanover High School sporting event! This program has been around since 2007, however, it is really starting to gain a lot of popularity among various fourth graders and sports teams within the district.

The program is actually quite simple to orchestrate. All 4th grade teachers are given a schedule of when they can elect a student from their classroom to become the "Honorary Hawk" at their chosen sports game. Students from the 4th grade classrooms are chosen based on their recent effort for good attendance,



striving to work hard on grades, no weekly disciplinary referrals, and outstanding character. Fourth grade students are recognized at the various sporting events and they work hard for this recognition and strive to wear the coveted orange "Honorary Hawk" jersey to the game. Coaches and players on the sports teams love the honor-

ary hawk and various referees and officials find them to be encouraging to others, and helpful to them throughout the game.

The next time you see an Honorary Hawk jersey, be sure to congratulate the student wearing it for having a super week at school! Go Nighthawks!

Careers Class at the Middle School



Hanover Middle School 8th graders are learning it is never too early to think about the future. All 8th grade students are required to take a Careers Class with guidance counselor, Mrs. Debra Caler. Mrs. Caler covers a variety of topics with students including preparing for the transition to high school, as well as a focus on college and career readiness.

The class begins with students being introduced to the many course options available at Hanover High School. Following this course overview, students complete an interest inventory which helps to identify possible future career paths. This activity is in preparation for a research project that allows the students to gather current information on a particular career. Students research the educational requirements and trends of each occupation. The information gathered is compiled into a presentation which is presented to classmates.

Mrs. Caler has expanded the Careers Class with visitations to community businesses. Students recently visited Elsner Engineering, Inc. to tour the facility and learn about the opportunities in the field of manufacturing. Mrs. Caler will be reaching out to other businesses in the Hanover Area Community to schedule future visitations for our students. Guest speakers are also invited to Hanover Middle School to present to the class. Hanover High School graduate, State Representative Kate Klunk, spoke to the Careers Class about her journey to become our State Representative. Another Hanover graduate, Rachel (Henry) Mummert, spoke about becoming an entrepreneur in the field of photography. Students have enjoyed these unique opportunities to interact with members of the community and learn from their experiences.

It is our hope through the Careers Class that students will gain a better understanding of the importance of college and career preparation, along with an awareness of the many opportunities available to them in the future.


