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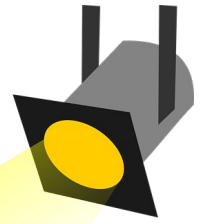

SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT:



Mathematics:



We have been using the Properties of Numbers to simplify expressions and solve equations. With this new concept, students will start using formula sheets to find area of both two and three dimensional shapes. Students are continuing to work through i-Ready to apply skills learned in the classroom. This will help to enhance their understanding of mathematical concepts.

Social Studies:

In Social Studies classes, 6th graders will be continuing our trip around the world. As students are wrapping up the Geography of Africa, we will be making our next stop in Southwest Asia. Over the course of the month, we will be investigating the physical and human geography features of the various regions of Asia, including Southwest Asia, South Asia, East Asia, and Southeast Asia!



Science:

In science class, sixth graders are continuing to explore all about oceans, the atmosphere, and climate and how they all work together to shape our planet. Following this, we will begin our unit on Weather Patterns and investigate the various patterns and how around the world.



ELA:

This unit offers a mixture of texts about real individuals and fictional characters who achieve their personal best through wrestling with familiar and realistic struggles. After reading these stories and informational texts about individuals and characters that strive for their personal best, students will have the opportunity to write a literary analysis argumentative essay.
