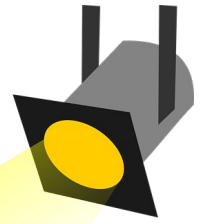

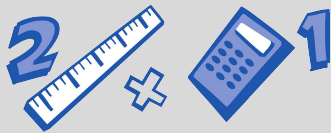

SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT:



Mathematics:

In math, students will continue working with integers and rational numbers. We will move into using integers and rational numbers in all operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division). Students would benefit from extra practice on calculating through work on iReady, Aleks and additional math resources.



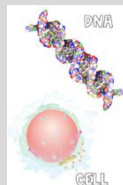
Social Studies:



6th grade just finished up their interviews for JA BizTown. All the students have been assigned their jobs and are busy working in their business groups to prepare for the trip. They're making ads, filling out business costs sheets, and creating logos and slogans. After we wrap up BizTown in the middle of October, we are moving into The Essentials of Geography. Students will learn to think spatially, learn The Five Themes of Geography, and begin learning about the regions of the world!

Science:

As we finish up learning about the functions of each organelle in our cells, we will begin to learn how cells work together to form tissues, organs, and organ systems. Your student will not only learn definitions, but will also understand how cells are the building block of human life.



ELA:

Our class will learn how to read fiction stories and nonfiction articles carefully as we finish working through Unit 1. During this time our class will focus on:

- Ways to talk about their reading with partners and the class.
- Strategies to figure out the meanings of hard words they read.
- How to find important details in fiction stories and nonfiction articles as they read.
- How to analyze what they read and write about it.



We will be focusing heavily on the text dependent analysis writings. These writings ask students to analyze a text and then provide evidence to support this analysis. This life-long skill can be tricky, but is so important to encourage worthwhile reading.
